Gottman - John Mordechai Gottman (born April 26, 1942) is an American psychologist and professor emeritus of psychology at the University of Washington. His research focuses on divorce prediction and marital stability through relationship analyses. Gottman's work is centered on the field of relationship counseling: enhanced relationship functioning and mitigation of behaviors detrimental to human relationships. Gottman's work has also contributed to the development of important concepts on social sequence analysis.

In 1996, Gottman co-founded and led The Gottman Institute alongside his wife, psychologist Julie Schwartz Gottman. Together, they are the co-founders of Affective Software Inc., a program seeking to make marriage and relationship counseling procedures more accessible to a broader audience.

It is the fourth installment in the *I Know What You Did Last Summer* franchise and a sequel to *I Still Know What You Did Last Summer* (1998). The film stars Madelyn Cline, Chase Sui Wonders, Jonah Hauer-King, Tyriq Withers, Sarah Pidgeon, Billy Campbell, Gabbriette Bechtel, and Austin Nichols, with Freddie Prinze Jr., and Jennifer Love Hewitt reprising their roles as Ray Bronson and Julie James from the first two films. The plot takes place 27 years after the Tower Bay murders in the second film, when another hook-wielding killer appears and begins targeting a group of friends one year after they covered up a car crash in which they killed someone.

Plans for a fourth film in the franchise started in 2014, when Mike Flanagan and Jeff Howard signed on to write a reboot with no connection to the previous installments. However, this version ultimately fell through. Following the cancellation of the 2021 television series adaptation, the project was relaunched when Robinson pitched her version to Sony Pictures. The film was put into early development in February 2023, with producer Neal H. Moritz returning. Prinze Jr. and Hewitt were confirmed to be returning in 2024, with the new cast members joining throughout the year. Filming took place between October 2024 and March 2025 in Sydney and Los Angeles.

I Know What You Did Last Summer premiered at the United Theater on Broadway in Los Angeles on July 14, 2025, and was theatrically released by Sony Pictures Releasing in the United States on July 18. The film received mixed reviews from critics and has grossed \$64 million worldwide.

It also draws inspiration from the urban legend known as "the Hook", as well as the slasher films *Prom Night* (1980) and *The House on Sorority Row* (1982).

Williamson was approached to adapt Duncan's source novel by producer Erik Feig. Where *Scream*, released the previous year, contained prominent elements of satire and self-referentiality, Williamson's script for *I Know What You Did Last Summer* reworked the novel's central plot to resemble a straightforward 1980s-era slasher film.

I Know What You Did Last Summer was released theatrically in the United States on October 17, 1997. It received a mixed reception from critics and grossed \$125.3 million worldwide on a budget of \$17 million, staying in first place at the U.S. box office for three consecutive weeks. The film was parodied in *Scary Movie* (2000) and is frequently referenced in popular culture, as well as being credited alongside *Scream* with revitalizing the slasher genre in the 1990s.

The film was followed by a sequel, *I Still Know What You Did Last Summer* (1998), in which Hewitt, Prinze Jr., and Watson reprised their roles. A straight-to-video standalone sequel, *I'll Always Know What You Did Last Summer* (2006), featured an entirely new cast. Following a television series adaptation released by Amazon Prime Video in 2021, a legacy sequel to the first two films was released by Sony Pictures in July 2025.

Julie James (*I Know What You Did Last Summer*)

Over time, her evolving arc across the series has earned her recognition from both fans and critics as a prominent and enduring final girl. Her resilience, determination, and ability to outwit her pursuers have solidified her place as one of the genre's most memorable heroines. Today, she remains a touchstone for discussions about the evolution of the "final girl" in modern horror.

Jennifer Love Hewitt

Know What You Did Last Summer (1997), a role she reprised in the sequels *I Still Know What You Did Last Summer* (1998) and *I Know What You Did Last Summer - Jennifer Love Hewitt* (born February 21, 1979) is an American actress, producer and singer. Hewitt began her career as a child actress and singer, appearing in national television commercials before joining the cast of the Disney Channel series *Kids Incorporated* (1989–1991), which won her a Young Artist Award in 1994. She had her breakthrough as Sarah Reeves Merrin on the Fox teen drama *Party of Five* (1995–1999) and rose to fame as a teen star and "scream queen" for her role as Julie James in the horror film *I Know What You Did Last Summer* (1997), a role she reprised in the sequels *I Still Know What You Did Last Summer* (1998) and *I Know What You Did Last Summer* (2025).

Hewitt's other notable films include the teen comedy *Can't Hardly Wait* (1998), as Amanda Beckett, as well as *Heartbreakers* (2001), *The Tuxedo* (2002), and the two *Garfield* live-action films (2004–2006). She has starred as Melinda Gordon on the CBS supernatural drama *Ghost Whisperer* (2005–2010), Riley Parks on the Lifetime drama series *The Client List* (2012–2013), Special Agent Kate Callahan on the CBS crime drama *Criminal Minds* (2014–2015), and since 2018, Maddie Buckley on the Fox/ABC first-responder procedural *9-1-1*. She has won twice for the Saturn Award for Best Actress on Television for *Ghost Whisperer* (2007–2008) and was nominated for the Golden Globe Award for Best Actress – Miniseries or Television Film for *The Client List* pilot film (2010).

In music, Hewitt has released four studio albums. After her debut album, *Love Songs* (1992), was released at age 12 in Japan, she recorded *Let's Go Bang* (1995), *Jennifer Love Hewitt* (1996) and *BareNaked* (2002), the latter of which became her first album to chart in the United States, peaking at number 37 on the *Billboard* 200 chart. Her most successful single on the *Billboard* Hot 100 chart was the 1999 release "How Do I Deal", which peaked at number 59. In addition to music and acting, Hewitt has served as a producer on some of her film and television projects. She appeared on *Forbes*' annual Celebrity 100 list in 2008 and her 2010 dating-advice book *The Day I Shot Cupid* (2010), became a *New York Times* bestseller. Labeled a sex symbol, she has appeared in several magazines' lists of the world's most beautiful women.

Iza Calzado

Known for her roles in blockbusters and independent films, particularly drama, psychological thriller and horror, she has received numerous accolades, including an Osaka Asian Film Festival Award, an Asian Television Award, a Gawad Urian, a Luna Award and three Metro Manila Film Festival Awards, in addition to nominations for five FAMAS Awards. Her films have earned ₱1.96 billion, making her one of the highest-grossing Filipino box office stars this century.

Calzado, daughter of choreographer and actor Lito Calzado, initially played bit roles in two films as a child actress, including Lino Brocka's *Kung Tapos Na Ang Kailanman* (1990). She took a long break from the show business and returned in the early 2000s through stints in commercials. She played a supporting role in the soap opera *Kung Mawawala Ka* (2002) and landed her first leading role in the romantic drama *Te Amo*,

Maging Sino Ka Man (2004). She gained early recognitions for her roles in Milan, Sabel and Sigaw, winning the Gawad Urian for Best Supporting Actress for the latter. Calzado made her breakthrough by playing one of the leads in the fantasy action Encantadia (2005).

She went on to star in several commercially successful films, including Moments of Love (2006), Ouija (2007), Starting Over Again (2014) and Etiquette for Mistresses (2015). Her starring roles in Impostora (2007), All About Eve (2009), Beauty Queen (2010), Hawak Kamay (2014), A Love to Last (2017) and Ang sa Iyo Ay Akin (2020) established her as a leading actress in soap operas. She also received widespread critical acclaim for her performances in Dukot (2009), Mga Mumunting Lihim (2012), Haunted Mansion (2015), Bliss (2017) and Culion (2019). Calzado served as one of the jury at the 4th Hanoi International Film Festival in Vietnam and a member of the committee at the Cinemanila International Film Festival in 2010.

Make It Last Forever (album)

The album's biggest hit was "I Want Her", a number-five hit on the Billboard Hot 100 and the first number-one R&B hit for Sweat. The title track (a duet with Jacci McGhee) followed "I Want Her", making the number two R&B spot, while "Don't Stop Your Love" and "Something Just Ain't Right" were also major top ten hits on the Billboard R&B charts. In addition, album tracks such as "Right and a Wrong Way" and "How Deep Is Your Love" received substantial radio airplay and can still be heard on quiet storm format stations. On April 6, 1994, Make It Last Forever was certified triple platinum by the Recording Industry Association of America, for shipments of three million copies in the United States. The single "I Want Her" was certified gold by the RIAA on June 13, 1989, for shipments of 500,000 copies in the US.
